From the Interim Rector...

The Holy Spirit of God

One of the central points in the Rite of Baptism is the anointing with the Oil of Chrism and the calling of the Holy Spirit into the life of the new Christian: "*N*, you are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever." (<u>Book of</u> <u>Common Prayer</u>, p. 308) This is a concrete expression of the gift of the Holy Spirit given to the apostles after the resurrection of Jesus the Christ from the dead. At Baptism, we pray,

"Heavenly Father, we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit you have bestowed upon these your servants the forgiveness of sin, and have raised them to the new life of grace. Sustain them, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give them an inquiring and discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works. Amen." (BCP, p.308)

In the celebration of Eucharist, the invocation of the Holy Spirit, or *Epiclesis*, is an essential part of every Eucharistic Prayer: We pray that the bread, the wine, and the people of God be sanctified by the Holy Spirit. We are called upon to remember God's gift of the Holy Spirit to all at Pentecost, and to each of us, in a special way, at Baptism. As the priest extends his hands over the bread and wine, *he* says,

"Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace." (<u>BCP</u>, p. 363)

The calling of the Holy Spirit to enter our lives in worship is also a key moment in the ordination of the ministers of the Church. Prior to the consecration of a deacon, priest, or bishop, the community sings the *Veni Creator Spiritus* or the *Veni Sancte Spiritus*:

"O Holy Spirit, by whose breath, life rises vibrant out of death;

come to create, renew, inspire; come kindle in our hearts your fire.

you are the seeker's sure resource, of burning love the living source,

protector in the midst of strife; the giver and the Lord of life.

In you God's energy is shown, to us your varied gifts made known.

Teach us to speak, teach us to hear; yours is the tongue and yours the ear."

(<u>1982 Hymnal</u> #502)

As priests gather around and lay hands on the new deacon or priest, the ordaining bishop says, "Therefore, Father, through Jesus Christ your Son, give your Holy Spirit to *N*; fill *him* with grace and power, and make *him* a Deacon (or Priest) in your Church." (BCP, p. 533)

In the ordination of a bishop, the following prayer is made: "Therefore, Father, make *N*. a bishop in your Church. Pour out upon *him* the power of your princely Spirit, whom you bestowed upon your beloved Son Jesus Christ, with whom he endowed the apostles, and by whom your Church is built up in every place, to the glory and unceasing prayer of your Name." (BCP, p. 521)

Here we are reminded not only of God's gift of the Holy Spirit but also of Jesus' sending of the apostles to all people in all nations for all time. "As the Father has sent me, I send you," he said. "Do not be afraid; I am with you." (John 20) It is our challenge through Baptism and Eucharist to proclaim God's word by our own words and our own lives. Jesus speaks to us today as he spoke to the apostles two thousand years ago, and some of us doubt his word just as some of the apostles, even after the resurrection, continued to hesitate. The Gospel for Trinity Sunday describes the scene.

Meanwhile, the eleven disciples were on their way to Galilee,

headed for the mountain Jesus had set for their reunion. The

moment they saw him they worshiped him. Some, though, held

back, not sure about worship, about risking themselves totally,.

Jesus, undeterred, went right ahead and gave his charge: 'God

authorized and commanded me to commission you: go out and train

everyone you meet, far and near, in this way of life, marking them by

baptism in the three-fold name: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Then

instruct them in the practice of all I have commanded you. I'll be

with you as you do this, day after day after day, right up until the

end of the age'." (Matthew 28:16-20)

God gives us the wonderful presence of the Holy Spirit in our minds and hearts, and in our community of faith, and God asks of us something in return. It is more than a request; it rather an injunction to use well the gifts we are given. God gives us the fullness of God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and calls upon us to be faithful and generous stewards of these gifts. This is our challenge: to give as we have received; to proclaim the Word of God to everyone, everywhere, without regard to race, gender, age, social-economic status, and especially without regard to our own perception about their worthiness. It is God's gift we proclaim by our words and by our lives; God's life; God's Word; God's Holy Spirit.

God wants to fill us with the Holy Spirit because God loves us. And when we want to receive the Holv Spirit because we love God, we share in God's life. We live in God and God lives in us as God has promised. We become Spirit-filled and we bear the fruit of the Spirit. How wonderful it would be if, when people heard the word Christian, they recognized the fruit of the Holy Spirit of God: joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.(Galatians 5:22-23) During this Pentecost season let us make it a point to look for these gifts in one another and to encourage one another in our Christian life. We will find that in seeing the fruit of the Spirit in others, our own spirits will flourish abundantly. "If the Spirit is the source of our life, let the Spirit also direct its course." (Galatians 5:25)

"Förderverein" Update: Bishop does not 1. agree to using the Förderverein (FV) to pay the Rector but says it could be used for ministries. FV crucial though for tax purposes. It might be possible to prevent conflicts between the church and the FV by carefully drafting the by-laws. Italian churches to be contacted because they have a rather complicated system as well.

Grant for search and moving costs for a 2. new Rector: Bishop suggests we apply to the Convocation.

Community Service: Peter 3 Schüppenhauer has suggested that the church offer this for delinquent youth

Exhibition Theo Crash: Confirmed that 4. the church can be used for his exhibition from 9 to 21 November.

Vendor policy at Christmas Bazaar: The 5. vestry re-affirmed the policy of not having outside vendors this year. However, parish members who wish to sell things at the bazaar are not outside vendors.

Spring 2010 Flea Market: To be planned 6. as a joint event with the Pentecostal community, possibly around St. Augustine's Day on 26 May.

CHOIR NEWS

The past weekend, 22nd--24th May saw the visit from **"The Baroque Singers" from Tunbridge Wells**. Tunbridge Wells is the twin Sister City to Wiesbaden, so as a first time visit initiated by them, they chose St. Augustine's.

The Choir arrived on the Friday evening and were invited guests at a reception given at the Wiesbaden Town Hall hosted by the Mayor.

Their aim for such a visit was to conduct a one day workshop on selected Choral Anthems. This was an open invitation to all past and present choir members and musicians to participate in. This finished with a concert in the Church on the Saturday evening at 7.30pm consisting of all the music that had been worked and rehearsed on that day.

Included in the concert programme were several madrigals performed by the Baroque Singers. This style of singing was by far a speciality of theirs, with which they performed with great skill and technical ability, at times displaying many musical subtleties.

We had two singers visit us from Darmstadt, a selected few from St Bonifatius with some others in attendance, including some of our own choir members. The Baroque Singers are a performing Concert choir. They don't particularly come from a specific Church. Their full membership normally consists of 25 people. They brought to us nine singers and their musical director.

The Choir was happy to help out in our Sunday morning service by joining our own choir, and this was something truly special.

All in all, with the coming together of like minded people, everyone had a really great two days of music making and fellowship. YAE Geneva Ascension Weekend 2009

"I know that I am not because I know I am!" What does that mean?

I am is the Old Testament name for God. Our theme was based on the fact that we are not the center of the Universe but God is. He is always with us and can help us through life if we let him.

Hannah Raval, Eric Dillenberger, Eric Leube and I left Wednesday the 20th of May for a fun filled, God filled and friendship filled weekend in Geneva, Switzerland and Taizé, France.

We met the Youth from Christ the King at the Frankfurt train station where the fun started and continued until the end of our journey, late Sunday evening.

We made great friends with all the youth and their leaders and all took time to learn, contemplate and pray. Many thanks to Phil Trumper of Geneva and his helpers; Catherine and Bailey for all their hard work, making it possible, smooth and really meaningful. Everyday we had prayer meetings, lesson, small groups, games, music, outside events and plenty to eat. Some of the questions we were dealing with were: What makes you have doubts? Do you blame God more than you thank him? Why do you think there is pain in the world? How can you organize your time to make room for God?

YAE at Taizé

Early Friday morning we left for Taizè and stayed until Saturday afternoon. It was eye opening! On our arrival the youth and adults were quickly divided into age groups and sent to bible study. Three times a day there was a Taizè service (Taizé chants, scripture, chants, silent prayer, and finally chants to close the service) and meals. There was also, tea, bible study, workshops as well as free time to take a walk, meditate or get an ice cream.

We concentrated on a Letter from Kenya, describing the problem and injustices there. Our group focused on how modern society needs to be more open and sympathetic to the needs of the people there and not just our own needs. How do you communicate your faith to someone who does not have the same belief? Here is our group's answer:

"After the small-talk, our different priorities form barriers.

"Through debating, we learn to respect our differences,"

"The courage to have conversation can lead to: friendship, understanding and agreement."

Our Taizè Project

After our return from Taizè we were treated to cheese fondue while listening to a yodelling duo with accordion, alphorn, wooden spoon and even cow bell accompaniment. On Sunday we each wrote a letter to ourselves, which will be sent in 3 months' time, reminding us of what we learned and encourage us to continue to follow our personal goals we set. The confirmation Service with Bishop Pierre W. Whalon was very moving, especially the testimonial from one of Geneva's YAE Youth, Jessica. We closed the YAE Event with a rousing rendition of our theme song for the weekend "Blessed be your name".

One of the saints depicted on our church windows is St. Boniface. He can also be seen as a statue outside Mainz Cathedral. On 5th June we celebrate the Feast of St. Boniface.

Boniface (or Wynfrith, as he was originally called) was born in Crediton, near Exeter, in 680. He studied at the abbeys of Newcell and Exeter and became a monk. Being of Saxon blood, he desired to do missionary work in Germany, in the land his ancestors came from. So, in 716 he left England for Friesland. There he tried without success to convert Radbold, the king of the Frisians (although Radbold had agreed with Boniface's teaching at first, he was angered by the thought that he might not meet his unconverted ancestors in Heaven). Boniface returned to England and then journeyed to Rome; in 719 he once again went to Germany, this time converting many of the Hessians. Pope Gregory II called Boniface back to Rome in 722 and gave him full papal backing for his missionary efforts. Upon his return to Germany, Boniface won fame for his courage in felling the sacred Oak of Thor at Geismar, and this greatly assisted his mission.

After reforming the Frankish church in a series of councils, Boniface founded the Abbey of Fulda in 743, and in 747 was made Archbishop of Mainz. As Archbishop he crowned Pepin as king of the Franks at Soissons and Pepin in turn assisted his missionary work. In about 755 Boniface resigned his Archbishop's seat and, as a humble monk, returned to Friesland to resume the task for which he had originally come to Germany. There he was martyred by wandering bandits, as he was confirming a group of converts. His body was buried in the great abbey at Fulda. The Feast of St. Boniface is observed on 5 June.
