## From the Interim Rector...

Paul says in the Letter to the Romans: "Hoping against all hope, Abraham believed in the promise of God" (Romans 4).

The story of Abraham is totally founded on his unbreakable faith in God. He is an example for us of a faith which trusts and obeys. Without knowing where God was sending him, Abraham sets off toward a destination which God promised to reveal in due time. "How naïve is that!" And some of you might say, "What incredible trust!" or "I can't understand a faith like that."

Abraham believed without seeing and without understanding. He believed by trusting God's promise to make of him a great nation. His faith is given us as an example. How often, in fact, in our own lives we are compelled to trust God, even though we cannot see the whole picture or understand where God might lead us. "Hoping against all hope, Abraham believed."

#### The Call to Abraham and Sarah

- to leave all home and family the comfortable and safe way of doing things
- to go to a land they had not seen and inherit it in all its fullness
- called to be blessed to be ones through whom the nations will bless themselves

#### A Journey without a Map - but with a Promise

- a journey accomplished in stages
- a journey that took a life time
- a journey in which God accompanied them
- a journey in which God from time to time did special things
- a journey in which Abraham and Sarah sometimes faltered, but in which they continually turned to God in praise and hope, building in each place alters and places of thanksgiving to God
- a journey, that ultimately saw them birth a nation
- a nation whose whole shape they never saw in the flesh
- but which came to pass according to the promise.

#### Our call is like Abraham's and Sarah's

- We are called to leave our attachments to our ideas of what religion is or Should be
- to make God our only loyalty to seek his approval rather than the approval of those around us.
- We are called to cherish the past of this parish, then to let go and move on with faith and with joyful confidence to the new life to which God is calling us today.
- We are called to be a family of God through whose name others will see God and be blessed.
- We journey by stages without a map but with a promise and with the presence of God to show us the way.
- We are called to listen and to set forth, day by day
- When we go forth in obedience thanking God and listening to his call we will see the promises coming true all about us and within us. (From <u>A Call to Abraham and Sarah</u>).

The faith of Abraham is a faith that reveals the welcome of our loving and merciful God who comes to meet us wherever we are. It is a faith that fills us with a hope for a new life which we will live, not in the darkness of sin, but in the light of God's merciful compassion. It is a faith that calls us to acknowledge with

thankfulness that we are saved from our sin by our God who loves us personally, uniquely, and always. And in our thankfulness, let us remember that <u>every</u> person is uniquely, personally, and always loved by God, and that we are called by our faith to meet <u>every</u> person with the respect and love we would show to Jesus himself. We do not fear; we believe in God's healing power and saving love.

As Paul said of Abraham, let no distrust make us waver concerning the promise of God, but may we grow strong in our faith as we give glory to God, being fully convinced that God is able to do what he has promised. Therefore our faith will be "reckoned to us as righteousness," (Romans) as we accept Jesus' invitation to follow him and to walk together the journey of faith in our loving God. Power goes out from Jesus and enter our hearts.

You will soon be welcoming a new priest and pastor. Welcome him with trust, hope and the certainty of God's loving care as you continue your journey as the People of God in this place. Be open to sharing your vision and to welcoming a new voice into your midst. Be joyful. Look toward the future with hopeful anticipation of all the blessings God is ready to bestow upon you, but live in the present moment of God's grace.



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#### Main points from the approved Vestry minutes of March and April 2010

#### This is what the Vestry have been up to ...

Information and decisions from May and June Vestry meetings

Recently we have been starting our meetings at 6.30 with a prayer service before we get down to Vestry business – thanks to Mary Ellen, Robert Ramsay and Raymond Hodgkinson for leading those Evening Prayers.

Here are the major things we have been dealing with – if you are interested in the detailed minutes they are, of course, on file in the office.

#### 1. Rector Search

A lot of time and energy has gone into this process, and we are very grateful and happy to have reached the end of our search process by calling the Rev. Anthony Litwinski to be the new Rector of St. Augustine's. He will be arriving in Wiesbaden on 25 August together with his wife Jana and their two cats. We are very excited about welcoming both of them – as they are about coming here – and ask for your prayers for their transition process from Hawaii to Germany.

A special "Thank you" is due to our Senior Warden, Peter Hellbach, for leading us in this process and putting endless hours of his (and his family's!) time into this.

#### 2. Sunday School

The Vestry have decided to purchase the Sunday School curriculum "Living the Good News" for our church. The material consists of different user-friendly modules for different age groups, so that the kids as well as our Sunday School leaders get the most out of their time together. We have applied to the Convocation for a grant to help buy the material.

#### 3. Undercroft Space

Benefitting the Sunday School, but also the new Rector, will be the transformation of the space downstairs, where in the area now dedicated to the storage of Nearly New a comfortable sitting room will be created that will serve as a Sunday School room for the older children and youth while during the week being a place the Rector can use for pastoral purposes.

In August this space will be renovated – please let us know if you can help (painting, donating material, moving furniture, making sandwiches for the workers – there are plenty of possibilities.).

Richard Nelson and his son in law are working on an outbuilding that is to house Nearly New and Book Sale stocks in the future.

#### 4. Transition Committee

In order to help Father Tony to get settled in Wiesbaden, we need your assistance in all sorts of practical ways. Peter Schüppenhauer will be heading the transition committee, and he knows what needs to be done. If you can help in any way, please contact him.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL

#### Sunday School Summer Activity

First of all thank you for all your service so far this year. As usual we will have our Summer break for July and August from now until we restart on Sunday 5th September. However we would like to give children a chance to continue their Sunday learning experience by having a series of DVD entertainment that we have available. We probably need to swell the ranks of willing child minders and it strikes me that mother/toddler who often come downstairs during the service can also help in this regard. However we are obliged to always have someone who has completed Safe Church training so would you be willing to take a turn and I'll look to see if some additional volunteers who have completed training can be brought to muster.

Please let me know of your availability over the next two months so that I could draw up a suitable schedule.

#### Sunday School Autumn Curriculum

The Vestry has approved our budget for Sunday School material so I'll work with Andrea Noble to get an order placed for the Living News series. I think we should plan a get together with the New Rector Tony to review the material in early September.

We'll concentrate on the younger kids for now, (grades 7 and up) and see if we start to get a demand for the older age group.

#### Sunday School Space Reorganisation

Talking of the older kids, further good news. We have the agreement from the Nearly New that the room they currently occupy will be vacated by the end of July. The Vestry have decided that this room can be turned into a small meeting room for Parishioner face to face with Rev Tony and on Sunday would make an excellent location for the Teens to meet for bible study. We had actually asked for the room to be allocated to toddler/Mothers but to access the room they'd have to pass through our Sunday School so Vestry thought that the an area nearest the kitchen would be most appropriate for nursing mothers and babies/toddlers.

Andrea, Colleen, Stefanie and I met for brainstorming what to do with the space available.

One idea we came up with would be to move the wooden Room divider from it's current position up to nearer the kitchen, carving out a small space for the toddler area. This would help sound proof the area from our teaching activities. Then we would have a single largish room for Pre-School and primary grades. What concerns me is if we start to get more Intermediate (Grade 4-6). We have what space we have and there isn't much more we can do about it but it will not be easy to split into smaller sections. If we don't get a teens group, then I think we should be able to make use of the Parishioner meeting space for our older kids.

Open to ideas here. So please pitch-in with any suggestions you might have for organising the space.

The Sunday School can be setup as a permanent arrangement. So we can really set-out things as we'd like them and not tear them down at the end of our sessions. One question was discussed whether we thought carpet appropriate for the undercroft? We have tried this before but the carpet quickly deteriorated over the winter with muddy shoes trailing in dirt from the nearly new visitors. Will the dampness we suffer also contribute to a return of the musty small we experience? Again much to discuss and mull over in the coming weeks. And again lets exchange ideas via e-Mail, I would love to get some feedback on what you think might work?

As it happens, Dorothee and Paul and me are going to walk from Coast to Coast in Northern England in September, some 190 miles or about 300 kms. We thought we would see if we can get some in the Parish to sponsor the walk at 10 cents a mile. i.e. that each sponsor would commit about 19 Euro total. Its a reasonable sum but we might get multiple sponsors and collect enough money for all our decorating needs. People are more likely to commit for a cause like Sunday School so I'm counting on this to be a success. I will announce this in the coming Newsletter and on Sunday from the Altar rail.

#### Future Plans

Every May there is a deadline to submit funding requests to the Convocation, so at Mary Ellen and Vestry prompting I submitted a request for 1,100 Euro funding for Sunday School in 2011 budget year. With the consolidation of the US Forces HQ in Wiesbaden (by 2015) involving a target population of 15,000 we really need to do our best to attract some of those new families to St. Augustines. So with that in mind I asked for funds to cover both expanded curriculum and more built in cupboards. We could invest in Godly Play material (hence the built in cupboards).

Again very much a case of thinking over the coming months what aspirations we have and executing on them.

#### Message of the Secretary General on IYD2010

This year's International Youth Day is a particularly important day for youth around the world. In December 2009, the United Nations General Assembly adopted resolution A/RES/64/134 proclaiming the Year commencing this International Youth Day (12 August 2010) as the International Year of Youth.

In line with the theme for the International Year, the theme for this year's International Youth Day is "**Dialogue and Mutual Understanding**". The choice of theme reflects the General Assembly's appreciation of the value of dialogue among youth from different cultures as well as among different generations.

International Youth Day will be celebrated at United Nations headquarters in New York with the global launch event of the International Year of Youth. The event will be a celebration of young peoples' energy, imagination and initiatives and will recognize their crucial contributions to enhancing peace and development. The event is an opportunity for the international community and the UN system to demonstrate their commitment to young people. But it will also be a fun occasion with musical guests and performances. A photo exhibit entitled "Visual Voices – Youth perspectives on Global Issues" will be inaugurated in the UN visitors lobby. The exhibit will be open to the public until early September.

In addition to the global launch event at UN Headquarters, there will be celebrations all over the world, which will highlight opportunities and challenges for youth throughout the International Year of Youth in different regions and countries.

Join in the festivities and celebrate the International Youth Day and the International Youth Year with other young people from around the globe!

#### Background of International Youth Day

In 1999, in its resolution 54/120, the General Assembly endorsed the recommendation made by the World Conference of Ministers Responsible for Youth (Lisbon, 8-12 August 1998) that 12 August be declared International Youth Day. The Assembly recommended that public information activities be organized to support the Day as a way to promote better awareness of the World Programme of Action for Youth, adopted by the General Assembly in 1995 (resolution 50/81).

#### THIS IS YOUR DAY AND YOUR YEAR!

Think about what you can do in your community and how you can effectively spread the message. Make it fun and relatable and use all your channels to spread the message. Think Facebook, Twitter, university newsletters, local newspapers.

- Educational radio show. Contact popular local/national radio stations to request a slot to have a discussion with distinguished individuals and youth.
- Organize a public meeting or debate to discuss young people's contributions to global issues.
- Initiate round table discussions among adults and young people to promote **intergenerational understanding**.
- Organize a youth forum to exchange ideas and discuss cultural backgrounds in order to help young people accept others and popularize a culture of non-violence.
- Organize a concert to promote International Youth Day and the launch of the Year. Invite your local musicians and combine it with a panel discussion or invite a politician or policy maker to hold the key note speech.
- Create an "info point" about youth-related issues in the center of town/village, at high schools, or at university centers.
- Organize an exhibition. Get permission to use a public space for an arts exhibit, which showcases the challenges of young people today or how young people are contributing to development. Try to involve young people in the domains of culture, arts and music, to raise awareness on youth-related issues.
- Write to your Minister of Youth to inform him or her about the challenges young people face in their daily lives and to suggest solutions. A list of Ministers of Youth can be found at www.un.org/youth.

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


